## Pet Services & Tips for Beach Park Residents

Our pets are an important part of our lives and we want to make sure that they receive the same care that we would provide ourselves. However, as those of us who have pets know, this can be costly. With that in mind, the Village of Beach Park, in cooperation with the Lake County Health Department, provides a low cost Pet Vaccination and Microchip Clinic twice a year. Our next clinic will be held on Saturday, October 1<sup>st</sup> from 9am-noon at the Milton C. Jensen Public Works Facility located at 40185 Glendale Avenue. CASH ONLY please! A major issue we have in Beach Park as well as our surrounding communities is the number of stray cats roaming our neighborhoods. For some, our initial reaction is to care for these strays by feeding them. Unfortunately, the bigger issue is that if they have not been sterilized they will breed and the population quickly grows which only increases the number of strays. Spay and Stay offers a humane alternative to the overpopulation of cats in our area by utilizing their Trap-Neuter-

Return program. Through this program you can help trap stray cats for sterilization and vaccinations. The cats are then returned to their original colony where their quality of life is improved and they are unable to breed. A couple of Village Ordinances to keep in mind pertaining to your pet: Village Ordinance 6.10: "Secured By Leash: It is unlawful for any owner of any dog, cat, miniature pig or other animal to go upon any public street, alley or sidewalk or other public place unless such animal is securely on a leash"

"Park or Public Playground: No person shall bring or lead any dog in any park or public playground area unless it is held by a leash not more than four feet (4') long". These Ordinances were put in place for the safety of our residents, so please make sure your pets are properly restrained.

"Animal Waste Disposal: It shall be unlawful for any owner of a dog or other domestic animal to walk said dog or domestic animal in or upon any public way or other public place in the Village of Beach Park without having on his or her person sufficient

equipment to remove from the public way or other public place any animal litter which may be deposited by said animal. It shall be unlawful for any owner of a dog or other domestic animal to allow said animal to deposit any litter upon any public way or other public place in the village or upon any private property not owned by the owner unless that person has the permission of the owner of the property or immediately removes said animal litter from the property."

For the health and welfare of our residents, we encourage you to follow these Village Ordinances.

## Mosquitos Test Positive for West Nile Virus in Lake County

A mosquito pool (or batch of mosquitoes) sampled June 23 in Highland Park has tested positive for West Nile Virus (WNV). The mosquito pool is the first confirmed indicator of the disease's presence in Lake County in 2016. In 2015, five human cases of WNV were reported in Lake County. In addition, 68 pools or batches of mosquitos and one bird tested positive for the virus.

"This is the time of year when we begin to see mosquito pools testing positive for West Nile Virus," said Mark Pfister, the Health Departments interim Executive Director. "Now that hot summer weather is finally here, it is especially important to protect yourself against mosquito bites by following the four D's—**Drain**: regularly empty water from outdoor containers; **Dress**: cover skin by wearing long sleeved shirts and pants; **Dawn and Dusk**: stay indoors during early evening and morning hours; and **Defend** : use insect repellent that contains DEET."

The Health Department maintains a WNV hotline for County residents to report areas of stagnant water (which are conducive for mosquito breeding), or to obtain more information on the signs and symptoms of West Nile encephalitis. ### Recommendations to prevent mosquito breeding include:

- *Discard old tires, buckets, drums or any water holding containers. Poke holes in tires used as bumpers on docks.*
- *Keep roof gutters and downspouts clear of debris*
- *Keep trash containers covered*
- *Empty plastic wading pools at least once a week and store indoors when not in use*
- *Drain unused swimming pools*
- *Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water*
- *Change the water in bird baths and plant urns at least once a week*
- *Store boats upside down or drain rainwater weekly.*



### Recommendations to prevent mosquito bites includes:

- *Whenever possible, limit outdoor activity at dusk*
- *Wear light-colored clothing that minimizes exposed skin and provides some protection from mosquito bites*
- *Make sure door and window screens fit tightly and that all holes are repaired*
- *Apply insect repellent that includes DEET, picardidin, oil of lemon eucalyptus or IR 3535 according to label instructions.*
- *Consult a physician before using repellents on infants.*

While most people infected with WNV have no symptoms of illness, some may become ill, usually 3 to 15 days after the bite of an infected mosquito. In some individuals, particularly the elderly, the virus can cause muscle weakness, inflammation of the brain (encephalitis), stiff neck, stupor, disorientation, tremors, convulsions, paralysis, coma or death.

The Health Department conducts a multi-faceted mosquito surveillance program in Lake County. Beginning in late spring and continuing into the autumn, a series of traps are set around the county, including within the Lake County Forest Preserves. At each site a pool, or batch, of mosquitoes is tested weekly for WNV. Areas of stagnant water are also investigated throughout the season for the presence of mosquito larvae, specifically from the Culex mosquito which is the primary carrier of WN in Illinois. Finally, the locations of dead birds are monitored to assist in the assessment of potential WNV activity. The Health Department works closely with the municipalities, townships and the Lake County Forest Preserve District in monitoring the mosquitoes that may pose a public health threat.

It is important to remember that other mosquito species carry disease such as Zika Virus, Dengue and Chikungunya, in areas outside northwest Illinois. People vacationing in areas with ongoing disease transmission from mosquitoes should protect themselves from any mosquito bites.

## Why Does Water Cost So Much?

Have you ever looked at your Village water bill and wondered why water is so expensive? After all, it is in Lake Michigan, free for the taking.

Well, while the water itself is free, treatment and delivery are not. Since we don't have direct access to Lake Michigan and don't have our own water treatment plant, we in Beach Park receive water from the City of Waukegan. Our contract with Waukegan provides for a rate based on the rate charged to Waukegan residents plus 24%. This compensates Waukegan for the expenses incurred in owning, operating and maintaining their water treatment plant as well as the distribution lines carrying water to Beach Park.

Once the water reaches Beach Park, it enters our water system comprised of miles of pipes of various sizes, along with the many valves and a meter serving each home


or business as well as our two water towers. These serve to store water but also to sustain and regulate pressure in the system. There are also in-line booster pumps necessary to boost water pressure to the towers. These require stand-by generators to ensure water supply during power interruptions.

Owning, operating and maintaining all of this infrastructure is expensive. That is where the Village's portion of the water bill comes in. This requires personnel vehicles and special equipment for routine work such as meter reading and hydrant testing and routine water sampling to ensure purity as well as emergencies such as water main breaks.

Once you've finished using the water it has to go "away". In



Beach Park, "away" usually means into a Village collector sewer which ultimately joins a North Shore Water Reclamation District (NSWRD) interceptor sewer and on to the NSWRD treatment plant. The Beach Park sewer charge on your water bill pays for the maintenance of our sewer lines including cleaning, repair and inspection


(televising) and maintaining the sewer lift stations which also need stand-by generators. NSWRD levies its own charges; \$1.16 per 1,000 gallons or \$15.08 per quarter for "Sewer Only" customers on private well water, to pay for their interceptor sewers and wastewater treatment plants. The NSWRD fee is not included on your water bill.

While our present rates are adequate to provide for routine maintenance and operation, as our infrastructure ages, it may become necessary to request a small increase in the Beach Park portion of the water rate to fund water and sewer line replacements. The water charge is presently \$2.69 per 1,000 gallons (unchanged since 1989) and sewer is \$1.40 (unchanged since 2008)


**THE NUMBERS**

The pie chart below illustrates these pieces of your water/sewer bill. The bar chart illustrates the fact that while the water rate charged to us by Waukegan has increased by 35% since 2010, neither the water nor sewer charges levied by the Village have increased AT ALL over this time.

## Guidelines for Draining Swimming Pools

Chlorinated water discharged to surface water (wetlands, lakes, streams, rivers, etc.), roadways or storm sewers has an adverse impact on local water quality. High concentrations of chlorine, which are present in swimming pools, are toxic to wildlife and fish. When draining your pool for the late fall/early winter, please follow one of the following measures: *De-chlorinate the water in the pool prior to draining.* This can be done through mechanical or chemical means. These types of

products are readily available at local stores. Or, *Drain the pool over a period of several days across your lawn* following these additional guidelines:

- 1) Allow pool water to sit for at least 2 days while receiving a reasonable amount of sunlight, and without further addition of chlorine or bromine. Test the chlorine level after 2 days to ensure that safe levels are met (below 0.1 mg/l).
- 2) Direct discharges from the pool across your lawn,

not down your driveway or into nearby storm sewer inlets. Our storm sewer system leads directly to wetlands, streams, lakes or rivers.

These recommendations are based on guidance from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.

## Burn Ordinance Reminder

As the Fall approaches, please note the following rules for open burning; *you can only burn landscape waste that is generated upon your property and only during the months of April through November.* It is unlawful for any person to burn any material within 25 feet of any structure on any property within Beach Park. The permitted times of open burning are from dawn until dusk and with a slight wind and no wind of more than 8-

10 MPH. No fire shall be set unless there is a fire extinguishing source available such as a garden hose with water from the house or some other type of water source of sufficient supply to extinguish the fire in the event of an emergency or compliance issue. The fire may not be left unattended and no fire shall be set in any public Right-of-Way, public land or public places, including ditches. If the fire becomes a nui-

sance to the neighbors you may be asked to extinguish the fire. There are some exceptions for open burning of landscape waste during the off months, but this is by permit only. Those can be applied for, at no cost, at the Village Hall. Complete details on open burning can be found by visiting the village website at

# Be fire smart with electricity throughout your home.




There are **nearly 47,800** home electrical fires each year.



About **half** of these involve lighting equipment or home electrical wiring.



Home electrical fire deaths peak between **midnight and 6 a.m.**



**Nearly half (46 percent)** of electrical fire deaths happen in **December through March.**

Plug only **one** heat-producing appliance (such as a coffee maker, space heater, or microwave) directly into a wall outlet at a time.



Extension cords should only be used temporarily. Have an electrician install additional wall outlets where you need them.



Never use an extension cord with a heat-producing appliance.

Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years

Check the manufacture dates on your smoke alarms today!

<p><b>1</b> Remove the smoke alarm from the wall or ceiling.</p>		<p>October 6, 2016</p>	<p><b>2</b> Look at the back of the alarm for the date of manufacture.</p>
<p><b>3</b> Smoke alarms should be replaced 10 years from the date of manufacture.</p>			<p><b>4</b> Put the alarm back on the ceiling or wall if it is less than 10 years old.</p>



A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire.



Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.



If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. Go to your outside meeting place.



Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement. Larger homes may need more alarms. For the best protection, make sure all smoke alarms are interconnected. When one sounds, they all sound.



Call the fire department from a cellphone or a neighbor's phone. Stay outside until the fire department says it's safe to go back inside.
